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

Ministry Report ~ by Kirk

Warm Tropical Christmas Blessings from the Jones Family to Yours!

Four-Fourteen Window

Leader training continues in monthly regional seminars and individual churches. For this report I would like to add how the 4/14 Window concept has captured the attention of many lay leaders and ministers. As a brief reminder, children ages four to fourteen are considered by some to be the world's largest unreached people group, with the highest receptivity to the Gospel and the greatest vulnerability to the enemy's attacks via disease, hunger, war and abuse.

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We held a Saturday afternoon teacher training seminar along with Carolina Canto, one of our faithful volunteer staff, who graduates Bible school this month. We taught a group of about twenty committed leaders who came after working their secular jobs all morning, then wading through a torrential rainstorm. They showed real appreciation and interest in strategies to reach the 4/14 Window in Panamá.

At the end of July over 500 of our AG ministers gathered to celebrate Panamá's Annual Minister's Retreat. Along with Ruth Steele, Christian Education and Marcos Palma, King's Castle, we led two plenary sessions on the 4/14 Window that were well received. We provided about 500 copies of CD-Rs with additional tools and resources for local church ministry to children, especially for the International Year of the Child.

SCDC Hispanic team

Larry & Melodee Gruetzmacher blessed Panamá and us with a team of Hispanic youth from our home district of Southern California. Larry reported:

"'Amazing, unbelievable, life-changing,' were the words used by the team of Hispanic youth who traveled with us to Panama on July 8-19. Many of these kids were not ready for what they were about to do, but God worked in their lives as they stepped out and did dramas, danced, worked puppets and shared their testimonies with hundreds of people."

During ten full days they ministered in seven churches and nine schools. God was divinely orchestrating His master plan even through something as mundane as trying to save money. Cheaper lodging put us in *Aguadulce* working with Presbyter Inocente Camargo. He told us that area had the highest incidence of youth suicides and attempts. At several secondary schools team members shared their testimonies of how God walked with them as they struggled with low selfimage, cutting, and even suicidal thoughts. What followed was one -on-one ministry talking about thoughts of suicide and different kinds of abuse. God did amazing miracles in many lives. Speaking the heart language of the youth made a big difference.

Panamanian Profile

Right after the KidsQuest Crusade in Cañaveral I tweeted this picture with a brief prayer request. Allow me to properly introduce you to Miguel & his wife Jacqueline Virginia. Miguel was a sailor for many years on oil tankers running up and down the Americas. Later he served for 27 years in the Panamá Coast Guard, rising to Lieutenant commanding his own patrol ship. He admitted he had lived a wild life, but later Jesus got ahold of his life. After retirement they moved to the countryside. He is a faithful lay leader at church.

During the night we stayed his cell phone rang often. It turned out that his 90 year old mother had passed away. He did not tell us at the time, another family member did later. So we returned to pray with them before the final Crusade. Through moist eyes he told us that three days earlier God gave him a vision of his mom dressed head to toe in white, with a big smile on her face. In the vision he asked her why she was smiling, but she didn't an-



swer. He took it as a sign that God would take her home soon. While I had been setting up an air mattress to sleep in his front room, he gently grinned and suggested I slide it over a ways so that if it rains the leaks would not wake me. Their story represents many believers, especially in our interior churches, who might be poor in worldly wealth are rich in spiritual fervency, storing up treasure where thieves cannot steal and moths will not

After spending time at the orphanage holding the babies, a need arose to have a values class with the 14-18 year old girls. I felt God stirring my heart to help. One of the first events was taking a group of 42 of them to hear motivational Christian speaker Nick ("No arms, no legs, no limits") Vujijic at the national stadium. In a special meeting with just the girls afterward, Nick shared that even though they may not have a mom and a dad, that God is with them always and if they are a daughter of the King, then they are princesses. With these words and a hug God began an inner healing in many of the girls. We were all in tears.



I then started a Bible Study for

them on Jesus' seven miracles in the Gospel of John. The group has about 25 girls. This has been a challenge, but slowly God is breaking down the barriers and the Holy Spirit is working in their lives. These girls live there because they have been abused, aban-

doned or have no family. When they turn 18, they have to leave the orphanage. My hope is that Christ will save them and get them started in a new

life serving Him.

Chloe

This is Chloe's final vear in nursing school. She is a fulltime student at Cox College, an RA at Evangel University, and working part-time as a PCA (Patient Care Assistant). One class she really enjoys is to "shadow" a school nurse, observing while she does her job. Something else she really enjoys is having her brother around.
